I would like to express my full support for the US Highway 14 four-lane expansion from New Ulm to Nicollet, which is a Minnesota Department of Transportation's (MnDOT) grant application for the U.S. Department of Transportation's 2019 Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) Transportation Discretionary Grant program.

The \$25 million federal grant would help fund the estimated \$85 million project, which is currently unfunded, to expand Highway 14 to four lanes from New Ulm to Nicollet. ### Dear Secretary Chao:

As President of the U.S. Highway 14 Partnership and a member of the Mankato City Council, I submit this letter in support of the Minnesota Department of Transportation's application for a Better Utilizing Infrastructure to Leverage Development (BUILD) Grant to help fund the expansion of U.S. Highway 14 between the cities of Nicollet and New Ulm in southern Minnesota. The U.S. Highway 14 Partnership represents cities, counties, chambers of commerce, businesses, and individuals along the Highway 14 corridor, all of whom have joined together in pursuit of one goal: to expand Highway 14 to four lanes all the way from New Ulm to Rochester.

As the only direct route connecting the growing economic centers of New Ulm, Mankato, Owatonna, and Rochester, Highway 14 is the lifeblood of southern Minnesota. In total, more than 350,000 people live along the Highway 14 corridor, making it the most densely populated highway corridor in Minnesota without a continuous four-lane connection.

Because of its importance to our regional agricultural and manufacturing economy, as well as our world-class medical facilities, the expansion of Highway 14 from two to four lanes between New Ulm and Rochester has been a goal since the 1960s. While we have made gradual progress in expanding the highway, the 12 miles between the cities of Nicollet and New Ulm on the west end of the corridor remain unfunded and unscheduled for expansion.

Since one of the primary purposes of the BUILD Grant program is to support projects that play a critical role in freight movement, Highway 14 should rise to the top of the list. The remaining two-lane segment of the highway is a significant impediment to commerce. It results in inefficient movement of goods for existing businesses and discourages new industries from considering our communities because access to a four-lane highway is vital to their operations.

Moreover, forcing the significant truck traffic on Highway 14 to share a two-lane road with passenger vehicles has too often had deadly consequences. This two-lane highway experiences a rate of heavy commercial traffic that is on par with many four or six-lane interstate highways. Over the years, crash data has shown that accidents on Highway 14 are significantly more likely to result in a death or debilitating injury than other corridors in the state. Despite gradual improvements, the corridor remains extremely dangerous today, with the most recent fatality coming just last year.

Highway 14 has killed or injured so many that just saying the words "Highway 14" in southern Minnesota evokes frustration, dread, and mourning. The corridor's safety issues are well known and well documented in the local press. In January 1999, the New Ulm Journal published an editorial entitled, "Why wait until 2020?" urging policymakers to fund the project as soon as possible. Unfortunately, progress was slow to come. Eleven years later,

the Mankato Free Press published a multi-page feature entitled "Decade of Death," noting that Highway 14 had a fatal accident rate 94% greater than the state average. Now, while some progress has been made, lives continue to be lost. Nine years after its "Decade of Death" feature, the Mankato Free Press published an article calling U.S. 14 a "Highway to Hell."

The BUILD Grant application before you today could be the final piece in ending this decades-long struggle to build a safe, efficient highway that we don't have to dread our loved ones driving on every day. Please approve this grant application so that no more families have to lose loved ones unnecessarily, and no more of our friends and neighbors have their lives irreparably changed by serious injuries.

I would first like to thank you for the opportunity to express my concerns with the current Highway 14. I also appreciate the consideration of Minnesota Department of Transportation's application for grant funds to improve Highway 14 from the U.S. Department of Transportation's BUILD program.

As a member of the Courtland Fire Department for 19 years and currently the Chief for the past nine years, I have witnessed numerous accidents and deaths that could have been avoided by having a divided roadway. Two fatalities remain vivid in my mind. One was a motorcycle versus a pickup in which the motorcyclist was killed. The last one was a year ago and occurred when a pickup and trailer crossed the center line colliding head on with a work van, killing one of the occupants. I was the first responder on the scene and I knew the patient. The first thought was he was only unconscious, I kept checking for a pulse, all to no avail and he wasn't breathing. His legs and body were pinned in the driver's seat. We rapidly began extricating him from the passenger side of the van because of the severe damage on the driver's side. At that point I realized we were not going to be able to revive or save him. He left behind a loving wife and three young children. Had there been a center median, I believe the head on collision could have been avoided.

I would also like to briefly mention the need for a bypass around the City of Courtland. Working for the Public Works Department in town, I see the frustration with myself and residents in trying to cross or merge onto Highway 14. Often time traffic is vehicle to vehicle from one end of town to the other, as car and truck traffic has tremendously increased after the segment from Nicollet to Mankato was completed several years ago. Residents trying to cross or merge onto the highway become frustrated from waiting long periods of time, and often dart across or dangerously merge with traffic. At the intersection of County Road 24 and Highway 14, traffic often backs up so far that residents begin taking side streets east or west to gain access at other intersections. Our fire station is located on County Road 24 and often times when responding to emergency calls, we cut down side streets because there is no room for our emergency vehicles to maneuver through the backed up traffic. With the emergency vehicles and many

residents using the side streets, these narrow streets have become very dangerous to pedestrians and has slowed our response times to critical incidents.

Furthermore, the increased speeds and increased traffic in town have put homeowners, pedestrians, and kids on bicycles in danger. During my lifetime in town, there have been three houses struck by cars that have veered off the road. In fact this past winter a car veered off Highway 14 and struck a parked semi. Had that semi not been parked there the car would have ended up in the nearby homeowner's living room. Many of the boulevards are very narrow with minimum street parking, some of the houses only five or six feet off the highway. Having a bypass around town could once again make our Main Street safe for kids on bicycles and pedestrians to use the sidewalks.

Finally, having a bypass and safe interchange in town would provide farmers and the heavy truck traffic easier and safer access into and out of town. We have a feed mill, grain elevator, several Ag businesses, two large industries and two trucking firms that place heavy truck traffic on the road daily. Current accesses are not wide enough for the semi to turn without driving over the curbs or sidewalks. Many farmers haul their grain to town with gravity boxes and trailers. Their speed is considerably slower than normal traffic creating a danger for both the farmer and the motorist.

Thank you once again for the consideration of the BUILD grant foundation project. Having this section of road completed will benefit our community economically and provide safe, reliable transportation routes to all residents in town and southern Minnesota.

The Marshall Area Transportation Group enthusiastically endorses the application of the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) for a BUILD grant for the proposed expansion of U.S. Highway 14 between Nicollet and New Ulm.

This request for \$25 million in federal support will leverage the funding now being developed by MnDOT and the affected county and city governments. MnDOT District 7 continues its aggressive design and environmental work so that this project can directly advance to construction upon receipt of designated funding.

The current two-lane segment, first engineered in the 1930s, contains numerous curves, limited sight lines and narrow shoulders. These features impede both freight movement and economic development initiatives, and pose many local and regional safety, access, and mobility problems. Given the steady long-term growth in commuter, freight and agricultural traffic in the New Ulm-Mankato corridor, it is no surprise that MnDOT rates this twelve-mile passage of U.S. 14 as one the half-dozen most dangerous roads in the state.

I am writing in support of the US 14 four-lane expansion project application by the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) for grant funds from the U,S. Department of Transportation's BUILD program.

Highway 14 travels East and West and is a primary Highway traveled in Southern Minnesota. When the Highway 14 was constructed years ago it was a road that worked to fit the needs of the people and traffic. Over the course of times the Highway has needed and has had some updates and reconstruction done to meet those need as well as to improve the safety of and for the people traveling on Highway 14.

Let me back track to April 16, 1988 for a brief summary of how the old Highway 14 has impacted my life and why I am writing and asking for the support for the Highway 14 project that needs to have grant funds to accomplish the project from Nicollet, Mn to New Ulm, Mn.

I was driving a Pontiac Sunbird and it was about 5-5:30 pm. I was driving on Highway 14 West, which at the time was a two lane Highway that went right through the town of Nicollet, Mn. I was going to turn left the Gas Station in Nicollet which was located just past Hewitt Roll A Dock. There was a semi coming through Nicollet from the east and I had turned in front of the semi. It was believed that possibly the sun reflected off the trailer. The semi in trying to avoid colliding with me took for the whole passenger side, roof and back of the car, the semi rolled in front of Hewitt Roll A Dock.

I was stopped breathing 3-4 times at the scene of the accident as the ambulance people were trying to immobilize and keep me breathing. It was then that the Volunteer Firefighters for Nicollet took over the life saving efforts and were able to get me breathing again. I was transported to Mankato Immanuel St. joseph's hospital by ambulance and then I was air lifted by Mayo Life Flight to St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester, Mn. I wasn't expected to live. I had my last rights given to me prior to leaving Mankato for Rochester. I wasn't expected to live. I was in coma for 10-12 days and had

total right-side paralysis for about 4-5 weeks. I was in the St. Mary's Hospital for about 2 months going through lots of different therapies. I regained full use of the right-side of my body while I was in the Hospital. After I left the Hospital, I was in an Outpatient Brain Injury Program at St. Mary's Hospital for 5 months.

I am a survivor of the horrific accident and am grateful for that. I live each day with a Severe Traumatic Brain Injury, severe depression, chronic anxiety, and PTSD. As I am aging I know for a fact that my memory is getting to be more hit and miss or selective. I don't know what am I going to remember and what I am not. I am on Disability as the on going issues and complications that are in result of the TBI. I have severe depression, chronic anxiety, PTSD which are affected and worsened by the TBI. I don't always know when I am going to get emotionally upset, I am not able to be in large group settings such as family reunions or with a group of friends. I am easily annoyed by noise(s), volume. decision making, going to new places, focusing on one conversation at a time, staying at task, remembering details to tasks, follow oral directions, just to name a few of the effects of the TBI.

Since then the Highway 14 Project has been completed from West of North Mankato, Mn to and around Nicollet, Mn. Highway 14 on that stretch has been converted to a divided four lane Highway from what was a two lane Highway and is rerouted around Nicollet vs through the town. It was done to better meet the needs of businesses, residents, farmers, commuters. I ask that the Project be granted the funding so that the project may be finished from Nicollet, Mn to New Ulm. Mn. I was lucky to survive my accident and have to believe by completing this project that there will be lives saved and save anyone in the future to have to live with life long results from a horrific accident. There is a lot of traffic that travels that stretch of road, there are a lot of commuters that rely on the safety of the roads to get to and from school, their jobs, their farms, and even traveling.

Thank you for your consideration of the Highway 14 four-lane expansion application for BUILD grant funding. Please make this happen.

I am writing to you in regard to the BUILD grant application for the Highway 14 project from New UIm to Nicollet. I realize that the deadline for the letters of support was yesterday and I'm sorry for sending this late, but there are a few points I would like to make in regard to the project.

I live and work in New Ulm, but I make frequent trips on this stretch of road several times per week. One main area of concern for me is turning off of Highway 14 into the ShadyBrook acres subdivision where my In-laws live. There have been several instances where I was trying to make a left hand turn across traffic to enter the area and have almost been rear ended in the process. I have to turn my blinker on about a half a mile before the turn and also tap my breaks to get the attention of the cars following me as there is not a turn lane for that area. There is so much traffic heading into New Ulm that the wait at certain times of the day is horrendous. I have also had to hit the gas and skip the turn as I am afraid that the cars behind me aren't moving over, forcing me to go up the road and turn at the Minnesota Valley Lutheran High School entrance and turn around. Which brings me to my second point.

Minnesota Valley Lutheran High School is currently right off of Highway 14. Not only do those students and faculty have to try to gain access to and from the school with all the traffic, but they also have ball fields right next to the highway.

Courtland is my next issue. Traffic does not slow down when going through town. I have friends that live in Courtland and are afraid to go for walks as the traffic is so bad. I will not take the "Courtland Cutoff" road anymore from Highway 68 as the wait to get onto Highway 14 is unbearable. Making a left hand turn from any of the side streets in Courtland is almost impossible, not only due to the traffic volume but also due to the speeds that some folks are driving. Traffic in volumes such as these should not be going through small towns.

Please help us with the funding for this project. Too many lives are at stake, not only the lives of the drivers on the road, but also the lives of the families, children, that live and work in the areas closest to this road.

Hi Doris,

I apologize for missing the deadline; I've had a rather hectic summer, but wanted to get my comments regarding Highway 14 to you regardless.

I am a resident of Courtland and live on Fiemeyer Drive on the east end of town, directly off of Highway 14.

I'm disturbed by the amount of traffic that travels through our little town on a daily basis. People who aren't from the area are truly astounded by the volume. I had some contractors working at my house about a year ago. They commented in disbelief at the frequency that semis drove by my home and down the "little main street" of Courtland.

Safety is a factor. Noise is a factor. Extreme use is a factor.

Safety first: The number of people on their cell phones when they drive into town is appalling. Slowing down as they enter the city seems to be their ideal time to check messages, change music, etc. We have at least a half-dozen children on our street. I worry with the volume of traffic with drivers not engaged in the act of driving in such a tight area will put one of them at risk.

Furthermore, drivers often pass other vehicles in city limits. I frequently see a car hurry to pass another just before they hit the 55 mph speed limit sign outside of Courtland. A very frightening thing to witness on such a frequent basis; I believe it is bound to end up in disaster sooner than later.

Even more frightening is watching impatient drivers pass in the MIDDLE OF COURTLAND in the 35 mph zone. Because we have two children's play parks and a ballpark, we frequently have kids and families afoot and on their bikes traveling to play, or going to the Courtland Mart or Swanzy's for food. I am literally terrified for everyone I see attempting to cross the highway. All it takes is one fool to pass on faith for tragedy to strike our community.

My daughter and I bike to all her softball games, and like to get out in the evenings for walks. There are times we are unable to cross the highway for a full 5 minutes because of the steady stream of vehicles traveling through town. She is landlocked by the highway; unable to go anywhere on the south side of the road. I cringe as she approaches each intersection, even when I am near. It's literally a nerve-wracking endeavor to go out on a bike ride with my child.

We have a regular stock of fresh roadkill in front of our home, a filthy exterior from the exhaust of the many vehicles passing by, and impressive strings of potholes that jolt the trucks and deliver a tremor to our house.

It is far past time to route this monster highway out of our little town. It outgrew Courtland a long, long time ago.

I would like to share my opinion on why the highway should be expanded to a 4-lane road. I worked for 37 years at the 3M Company in New Ulm. In that time, there were numerous times our operations in my department had to be shut down or quickly changed over to a different product that wasn't as high as other products. We would find out that the carrier couldn't get here in time. We ran into that quite often. On the other side of it, some of our finished products didn't get shipped because some carriers didn't travel that highway at certain times. I also think there is a high volume of traffic on that road everyday. That takes a toll on the surface of the road. It becomes filled with many pot holes. A few people over the years have mentioned needing front end alignments from hitting pot holes.

Highway 14 has seen fatalities occur on that road over the years. Last April we lost one of our sons best friends & classmate to a fatal accident. He was 40 years old with a wife and 3 small children. That hit our city very hard. A few years ago, a couple who were out for a Sunday drive were hit head on & killed. The man was an executive at AMPI, a big industry in New Ulm. They left behind 3 kids and grandchildren. Another young man was killed on his motorcycle when a car came over a little hill and struck him head-on.

I drive a school bus for New Ulm Bus Lines and use the highway everyday during the school year. There is always truck traffic on there. Many times people try passing trucks and it makes for a dangerous situation. While driving my bus on one occasion, I had a car pass me on my right side using the shoulder as a lane. That has happened more than once to other bus drivers. People try all kinds of dangerous maneuvers to get by someone on this 2 lane road.

My wife and I are very much in favor of highway 14 becoming a 4-lane road. Please, please, please strongly consider expanding the road. We are 64 years old and lifetime residents of New Ulm.
